







- Comparative (phylogenetic) tests






# Shiny rocks!

### Ruling out natural explanations

• Evidence of **deliberate selection**: non-randomly distributed, colour and shape more similar than natural chance

• Evidence of **polishing**: microscopic analysis shows smooth surface texture, and experimental barrel-tumbling with leather

produces shine









But why?



What does the ethnographic record tell us?



- What are all the ethnographically-attested uses of small (~1 cm) polished pebbles ("lustrous gravels")?
  - Supporting info for QUANTA project on the cultural evolution of numerical cognition
- Exploratory and descriptive work
  - Global, all eHRAF or SCCS cultures. I don't care about absence!
- "Pebble\*", "stones", "rocks", other synonyms?
  - Categories: counting, music, games, ritual, burial, jewellery, prayer

# 10488 pebble paragraphs

"pebble\* OR stone\*" NOT subject:building and construction

- 186 SCCS societies > 38 hunter-gatherer + 44 others by region
- Developed coding scheme for use, number, and containers
- What kinds of uses would you expect?

| Use      | Definition   | Example  |
|----------|--|--|
| Weapon   | Stones explicitly thrown at other people in defence or offence                               | The sling stones were not worked but were selected from waterworn pebbles (ala) of appropriate size. [Samoan]  |
| Medicine | Primary functional use given in a medical remedy   | Pour over the head of the sufferer an infusion of bark from the top of the trunk of the Bugare. But before pouring the liquid, it must be frothed. This is done by throwing little stones in and mixing it with a stick. [Azande]  |
| Music    |  | A woman's dance rattle contains many small pebbles and the handle passes entirely through the gourd. [Kuna]  |
| Counting | Explicit mention as a counting tool  | Pebbles are occasionally employed as a mnemonic aid to counting warp threads when weaving; each pebble represents 10 threads. [Aymara]   |
| Ritual   | religious symbols, curse stones, embodiments of spirits/gods,                                | There is a very strong magic power in these stones, and their form is regarded as variable. For instance, if such a stone is left uncovered it may grow legs and run away; so they are worn hanging from the neck in little sacks. [Aranda]                                    |
| Games    | •  | Thirty-three stones are arranged in a line which may be straight, but is more often curved or crooked. The player must touch each stone and say "Too" for all 33 stones in order, at a high rate of speed. [Kpelle]  |
| Tool     | Used in hunting, fishing, craft, headshrinking, or as weights                                | Dressing a hide is generally woman's work; sometimes men do this work, using woman's tools, which include a small sack of pebbles held behind the haft of the leg bone scraper to give added force to each push of the scraper removing fat and detritus from the hide. [Innu] |
| Other    | Various uses as ornament, social coordination, genealogical tool etc                         |  |




# It's probably not counting\*

Cross-cultural data to inform archaeological interpretation



#### Fourneau de Diable

136 pebbles (9x15) Dordogne, France Peyrony (1922)

- Magico-religious ritual use: talismans, amulets, charms, divination, sorcery kits, spirit and ancestor embodiments.
- Game pieces: occur in multiples, handled frequently, children use.
- Musical instruments: drums and rattles mimic tumbling (bark, shell, dried fruit, cocoons, hides)
